**Hebrews 4:14-5:10**

1. Why, according to 4:14, should we hold firmly to the faith we profess? \_\_\_\_\_  
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2. What is the significance, according to 4:15, of this great high priest?
  - a. He is up there and far away.
  - b. He is able to sympathize with human weakness...
  - c. He was tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin!
  - d. He understands and sympathizes with weakness and the need for help/strength/power from God, not with failure!
  
3. What, according to 4:16, should we take away from this understanding of Jesus as high priest?
  - a. That he gets it...so he understands why we sin.
  - b. That he is sympathetic to weakness, so he is willing to help.
  - c. That we can approach God's throne with confidence...
  - d. That we can find grace...
  - e. That we can find grace to help us in our time of need (specifically, the need for strength to be tempted, but not sin).
